FROM DOUG KURTZWEIL, CHAIR




COMMITTEE REPORTS

Fisheries by John Kaiser & Terry Kinderman

Dave Neuswanger, DNR Fisheries Supervisor for the Upper Chippewa Basin reports that they have completed the Long Range Habitat & Fisheries Plan for the Chippewa Flowage. It is the largest most comprehensive plan that they have prepared to date spanning thirty-six pages. The plan has been sent to the LCO Tribal Conservation Department for their input and recommendations. A final draft will be available to the public around July 13th. Until then, details of the plan are not available. Check our web page at www.cfapoa.org for a link to review the plan after release. Dave shared that the DNR will be looking to volunteer organizations such as ours to assist in implementing portions of the plans objectives. Some of these projects may include restoring areas of shoreline erosion, improving fish spawning habitat and funding for fish stocking in areas of the flowage where an imbalance of predator fish have reduced or limited natural reproduction. They will be seeking our support for fishing regulation changes to help control the overabundance of specific fish species. Dave Neuswanger who will be the featured speaker at the Annual Meeting & Picnic at Deer Run Resort August 5, 2007, at 11:00 a.m., will explain the plan and take questions. Mark your calendar!

If you haven't had the opportunity to fish walleyes this year, you may have missed some excitement. Many veteran guides, bait dealers, resort owners and fisherman report the best walleye fishing in years with many of the fish in the 17" - 19" size range. Be sure to get out there and enjoy the fun and those great fillets. Repeated cold fronts and unstable weather have kept the muskie fisherman frustrated for some time after the opener but with the warmer weather and welcomed showers passing through the muskies are getting real active and some very big fish have been showing up and some are biting.

We have noticed an increase of littering in the Flowage this year; i.e. plastic bottles, wrappers and aluminum cans floating on the water. Please help us by picking up litter with your landing net or by hand if you observe it and be sure to secure litter in your watercraft. Let's all pitch in to keep the wilderness experience of the Flowage alive and well for all to enjoy.



Invasive Species by Dennis Clagett

There is positive news on the purple loosestrife bio-control program. Last year's beetles that were introduced in three heavily infested areas have survived, and they are currently dining on the new growth purple loosestrife plants. This year we are doubling the number of beetles we are raising.

The DNR is working on a bio-control program to deal with Eurasian water-milfoil, which is prevalent in many areas of our lake. There are other exotic, or non-native species such as zebra mussels, spiny water fleas and Viral Hemorrhagic Septicemia (VHS) to be concerned with. Stay tuned! As always, your input and ideas are welcome!

Water Quality by Chris Jeffords

Sampling of the 24 sites on the flowage continues throughout the summer months. Typically, the secchi disc reading (visibility) is reduced and the chlorophyll data is elevated during the hot summer months. While increased nutrients can help in the food chain of the

lake ecosystem, too much phosphorous from fertilizer runoff can cause a more intense "bloom" later in the year. Many studies have shown that one pound of phosphorous can produce over 500 pounds of algae. We all need to support the reduced use of this in our watershed!



Sawyer County Lakes Forum

The Sawyer County Lakes Forum has been instrumental in coordinating regional resolutions to Wisconsin State Government banning the use of phosphorous containing fertilizers in most circumstances. The issue has now been proposed and is on the agenda for debate in subcommittee. Exceptions are appropriate and include those cases where soil tests confirm the lack of it in the soil. More on this as it develops.

Additionally, Sawyer County Lakes Forum has helped to coordinate strong resolutions banning the transport of aquatic invasive species. These resolutions were sent prior to the announcement of the VHS virus mentioned elsewhere in this newsletter and were focused mainly on invasives such as Eurasian milfoil, spiny water flea, rusty crayfish, etc. With the newly identified threat of VHS, the efforts of the DNR emergency rules make it critically important for all of us to follow the rules and insure others do the same.

Couderay Waters Regional Land Trust

With the recent announcement of the Moonshine Island Project having been completed by the purchase of the property by the LCO, activities by the board to identify further projects on the Chippewa Flowage have begun. The board is excited to continue the protection of key, sensitive areas on or around our lake.

The June annual meeting of the Couderay Waters Regional Land Trust board of directors was held June 16 and resulted in 2 members of the Chippewa Flowage holding board and officer positions. Doug Kurtzweil returned as board member, and Chris Jeffords elected Vice President. Congratulations to both and keep up the preservation and protection of our lakeshore on our behalf.

WATER LEVEL by Doug Kurtzweil

The water levels of the Chippewa Flowage have been of long-time concern to many of us. The record high temperatures and record low precipitation of the last couple years have heightened and spread this concern.


The Chippewa Flowage is NOT a lake; it is a flowage, a "storage reservoir." The Flowage was formed in the 1920's for 2 reasons only — flood control during spring run-off and to augment downstream flow for hydro-electric generation. There were a number of natural lakes, several river systems, a few farms, a village, and huge wild rice beds that are all now under impounded water. The recreational pursuits and economies were not envisioned at the time.

The water level is measured in terms of feet above sea level. "Full" is generally around 1312 to 1312½ feet. At 1313, significant erosion begins to occur on the islands and in many of your front yards. We all know what happened at 1309 1/2 (last summer). Xcel Energy is required to discharge a minimum of 250 cubic feet of water per second. That comes to 6.7 million gallons every hour.

There are 6 major interest groups, stakeholders, partners vitally interested in the integrity of the Chippewa Flowage. They are the Lac Courte Oreilles Band, the WDNR, the US Forest Service, Xcel Energy, the Lake Chippewa Flowage Resort Association, and your CFAPOA. I have been in touch with the spokespersons of the 5 other partners. While we might have different perspectives, we do have some common concerns and goals. The DNR Fisheries Management Plan will be addressing water levels as a potential tool for maintaining/enhancing the fishery. The partners seem to agree this could be the starting point for discussions which could lead to a water level regimen that would provide nearly all members of all groups with at least, what they need, if not what they want.

The Fisheries Management Plan will be based on science tempered by the input you provided at the Annual Meeting 2 years ago. Your prompt completion of the enclosed survey will give your Board the information and evidence we need to make certain your most important needs are effectively represented in these discussions. My opinion is: I would like to see the Flowage be a perpetual, semi-wilderness, naturally reproducing, walleye and panfish factory. I cannot advocate for your opinion unless you complete and return the survey.

(Oh, by the way, I am praying for rain too.)



Chippewa Flowage Storage Reservoir Forecast from Xcel

Elevation as of May 30, 2007: 1312.62 ft.

Season of the Year: Summer 2007

Comments

- ◆ Based on the current reservoir level, the ongoing drought conditions in the Chippewa River Basin, and the anticipated needs for water downstream, Xcel Energy intends to draw down the reservoir to elevation 1310.0 ft. (3 ft. drawdown) this summer.
- ◆ If above normal precipitation occurs during the summer months, the reservoir target elevation may be adjusted slightly upward depending on whether inflows to the reservoir increase.
- ◆ Current projections are to maintain higher reservoir elevations (above 1312.0 ft.) through the end of June, if inflows to the reservoir do not decrease below the required minimum discharge flow of 250 cubic feet per second (cfs). If electrical generation needs increase in June due to hot weather, unanticipated power plant outages, or if the current drought situation intensifies, additional water could be removed from the reservoir during June to increase generation at hydro plants downstream.
- ◆ Xcel Energy will notify the public in the event that reservoir levels are anticipated to decrease below the 1310.0 ft. elevation.
- ◆ Inflows to the reservoir are currently around 500 cfs, which are below normal for late-May. Inflows into the reservoir are expected to decrease considerably if precipitation remains at or below normal levels.
- ◆ The required minimum discharge (250 cfs) from the dam will be maintained at all times with increases in outflow at times during the summer season for downstream river flow augmentation.

* During abnormal stream and water conditions, or when other unusual and compelling circumstances exist (e.g., drought, dam safety concerns or required maintenance), the flowage elevation can be reduced below the 1310.0 ft. elevation.

AN IMPORTANT NOTICE ABOUT VHS FROM THE WDNR ...



Dear Wisconsin conservationists, anglers, boaters and lake stewards:

Viral hemorrhagic septicemia virus, or VHS, was found last weekend in Little Lake Butte des Morts in Winnebago County. We have subsequently had seven samples from Lake Winnebago test positive for the disease. VHS is a serious threat to our fisheries and to Wisconsin's \$2.3 billion fishing industry. Although we've been preparing for its discovery here for some time, we've had to act swiftly and comprehensively this week to curb any possible spread to other inland waters.

At the state level, we are in the process of developing monitoring procedures to track VHS. We've suspended all stocking of fish, transfers of fish among hatcheries or water bodies, and collections of forage fish or eggs from the wild. In addition, I have appointed a VHS response team to compile information and develop recommendations as we move forward.

This week, the Natural Resources Board also extended an April emergency rule aimed at preventing the spread of VHS to include Lake Winnebago. It prohibits anglers and boaters on that water system -- as well as the Great Lakes and Mississippi River -- from moving live fish from the lake and requiring the drainage of boats and livewells before leaving the landing. I commend the NRB's swift action. We don't want anglers and boaters to accidentally spread the disease to any additional inland waters.

It's important for you to know, however, that VHS doesn't affect people -- you can still keep and eat the fish you catch -- but it can kill a broad range of game fish. We need to work together to stop the spread of this disease. It is difficult to say exactly what impact VHS will have on our fishery or how many species it might affect in Wisconsin. However, experience in other states indicates that fisheries can and have bounced back. We are still going to have a lot of fish in our lakes and rivers for anglers to catch and enjoy.

Some of the emergency restrictions put in place may cause an inconvenience, but there's a lot at stake here. Wisconsin's public is the first and last lines of defense against this disease, and without help, we cannot fight VHS. Where ever in Wisconsin you are enjoying one of our 15,000 lakes, you can help slow the spread by practicing the following precautions:

- Do not move water or live fish from one water body to another. Drain the bilge, bait bucket and live well at the landing, dispose of minnows in the trash and put your catch on ice at the landing.
- Clean plants and other debris from your boat before leaving the landing; and
- Buy minnows from a registered Wisconsin dealer or catch the minnows you use from the same water you plan to fish.

Wisconsin's natural resources belong to all of us, and we all have a stake in protecting them. I've attached some links to more information about VHS. My sincere thanks for your help in this important effort.

RADON TESTING Radon is a natural by-product that occurs when uranium decomposes. Since uranium is found in this area, we can expect radon also. Radon is colorless, odorless AND the second major cause of lung cancer. We encourage you to test your home for it. Testing kits can be purchased locally. Radon has been found in at least one home on the Flowage and the homeowners have taken steps to protect themselves and their guest. Please make sure your home is safe too!

LIFE ON THE EDGE The CFAPOA has a deal for you! As an educational project, we have purchased the ideal booklet called, Life of the Edge, Owning Waterfront Property. It is filled with important information, websites and telephone numbers for you the property owner. The booklet was produced by the UW Stevens Point extension.
