## FROM DOUG KURTZWEIL, CHAIR

Greetings from the shore of the shrunken Chippewa Flowage. At this writing (end of September), we're down about 3 1/2 feet which means about 12,000 acres of water instead of 15,300. After "fishing" my little boat out of the mud twice, it's now over 1/8 mile from where it should be. I realize some of you have even greater problems. I hope the worst is over.

I want to share a few words about volunteerism and cooperation. Volunteers are the folks who make things happen and get things done for your CFAPOA. Whether serving on the Board, helping with events, building cribs, battling invasives, etc., etc., it's the volunteers who are the backbone and the muscle of this organization. To all of you who have given time, talent, or treasures—THANK YOU!

A great way to leverage the efforts of you volunteers is cooperation. Your CFAPOA has embarked on cooperative ventures with a variety of organizations; the DNR, LCO Conservation, and Couderay Waters Regional Land Trust. Our longest cooperative partner has been the Lake Chippewa Flowage Resort Association (LCFRA). Today a majority of your Board joined LCFRA in a strategy session to deal with the water level situation. By the time you read this, we should have had the first of what will be regular meetings with the folks from Xcel Energy. At the very least, if they do this again we will not be caught by surprise.

An extremely successful example of the benefits of combining volunteerism and cooperation is the Neighborhood Watch Program. The signs alone can be a deterrent, but when we truly "watch," and then make the call when necessary, we not only are being good neighbors, but we are also building community. And this leads into my next comment.

Our Chippewa Flowage neighborhood isn't just the backyards; it extends out into the "front yard" - the Flowage. Several weeks ago I heard a particularly ugly story. The way the story goes three fellows came to our area for a week to do some fishing. After that week, they left with 600 crappies. That's over 1,000 fillets more than they had any right to have. If this is true, they are not fisherman and they are obviously not sportsmen. They are pigs. They are thieves. They are stealing from all of us; they are stealing from the future. If left unchecked, this will lead to a 10 fish or even 5 fish bag limit for all the rest of us who play by the rules. When any of us are aware of something like this, we have to deal with it just like if we saw someone crawling through the neighbor's window. Wardens Miller (634-9658 ext 3516) and Heisler (266-2032) are eager to hear from us. There's also 1-800-TIP-WDNR. We owe it to ourselves; we owe it to the grandkids; we owe it to the Flowage.



## Fisheries by Nancy Ruhlow

The lake management plan for the Chippewa Flowage by the DNR is not finished. In speaking with the DNR, they anticipate it will be finished within the next two months.



This summer, they did conduct the first real musky survey of the Flowage since 1990. There were 8 people involved for 5 days of netting. Dave Neuswanger, DNR, said that 9% of the musky netted (and released) were over 45 inches. One of the fish was 51" and weighed 47 pounds. Dr. John Nay will use this data to study optimal water levels for musky spawning with the hope that this water level could be manipulated and maintained in the future.

Dave also reported that the Eurasian milfoil has all but disappeared in the Flowage but no one seems to know how or why.

Lastly, the DNR will be happy to work with the Fisheries Committee in the future on issues of protecting walleye spawning beds, tree drops and fish cribs.

# COMMITTEE REPORTS

## Invasive Species by Dennis Clagett

The third phase of the Purple Loosestrife bio-control project to raise and release *Galerucella* beetles was completed in July. Approximately 12,000 beetles were released in three locations on the east side of the Flowage. The release sites were coordinated with the LCO and the DNR. Follow up checks of the locations during August and September indicate the beetles are working; however, this is just a beginning. Thousands more beetles are needed. If there are members who would like to become involved in a beetle rearing project of their own, please contact me. I will help get your beetle farm started.

## Water Quality by Chris Jeffords

All samples of water clarity, phosphorous, and chlorophyll have been taken for 2006 between Memorial Day and Labor Day. 12 samples from 24 locations on both sides of the Flowage (same as last year) are now being analyzed and results should be available by the next newsletter. It will be interesting to compare these with last years results.

Additionally, elsewhere in this newsletter you will hear of the collaborative efforts being taken by CFAPOA, LCO, LCFRA (resort owners), DNR, Forest Service and others to begin a dialog with Xcel Energy and the Winter Dam operation. Communication and low water levels are top on the agenda for a public meeting scheduled Oct. 10th. While this newsletter may not reach all of you in time, it is being advertised in the newspaper and on the radio. We will be reporting the results of this meeting in the Winter Newsletter.



## WAL CONVENTION REPORT

CFAPOA Directors Doug Kurtzweil, Dick Kahler, John Kaiser, Chuck Block and Chris Jeffords represented the CFAPOA at the 28th Annual Wisconsin Lakes Convention in Green Bay on April 20-22nd at the KI Convention Center and Regency Suites. The convention offered the attendees an opportunity to share successes, challenges and solutions for the lakes and watersheds of the Chippewa Flowage Area with more than 450 concerned citizens, lake associations, businesses and government representatives from across the state.

The 2006 Lakes Convention, "Hands Across the Waters", focused on civic engagement, exploring ways for citizens to be involved in contributing ideas, energy and actions to protecting Wisconsin's waters for future generations. Governor Jim Doyle, Department of Natural Resources (DNR) Secretary Scott Hassett, and Paul Johnson, former chief of the U.S. Natural Resources Conservation Service, were among a number of people that addressed the gathering on issues facing Wisconsin lakes.

Wisconsin Attorney General Peg Lautenschlager, Paula West from Minnesota Waters, Mike Staggs, DNR Bureau Director for Fisheries Management and Habitat, and Richard Heinzl, founder of Doctors Without Borders - Canada were among a number of dignitaries, citizen advocates and experts who discussed the importance of citizen involvement in natural resource protection and other issues that impact Wisconsin waters.

More than 25 educational sessions and 15 interactive workshops were offered, led by Wisconsin water experts, including topics on aquatic invasive species, public involvement, land use, water law, fisheries management, aquatic plant management, lake organizations, water quality, land trusts and more.

For the past 28 years, the Wisconsin Lakes Convention has provided a unique opportunity for

people to come together and network with others over their interest in lake and water issues.

Members have brought back various ideas to help our beloved Chippewa Flowage, and all committees are actively incorporating these ideas into actions you are beginning to see. Water sampling, newcomer "shoreline steward" information packets, are just a few examples of tangible benefits of attending conventions.

## WISCONSIN LAKE LEADERS INSTITUTE

The Wisconsin Lake Leaders Institute is part of the Wisconsin Lakes Partnership composed of the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, the Wisconsin Association of Lakes, and the University of Wisconsin-Extension. The Institute is administered at the College of Natural Resources, University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point. Every other year the Institute conducts training seminars for about 28 individuals throughout the state of Wisconsin. I'm participating with Crew VI in this year's Institute. I have completed Session 1 held in Green Lake in May and Session 2 held in Minocqua last month. Session 3 will be in Baraboo later this month.

With so many lakes and so few people in service to protect them, it is clear that no state agency or unit of government can provide the management attention that each deserves. The decisions made by local governments, agencies, and special interest groups influence our local lakes. The Institute trains special leaders who are willing to join in on the decision-making and take time to share their talents beyond the shores of their own lake on issues common to all lakes. These committed individuals deal with a host of issues: lake ecology, watershed management, shoreland development, user conflicts, funding, organizational procedures, and bureaucratic red tape.

The Lake Leaders Institute seminars explore new ideas about lakes and the management of human use of lakes. The Institute also seeks to develop networks to share experiences and to encourage participants to learn from each other. Participants work and share with dedicated lake professionals. The Wisconsin Lake Leaders Institute is designed to assist in developing and enhancing both technical and people skills. Participants learn in an atmosphere of openness, trust, friendship and camaraderie.

Graduates of the program are expected to take

on active citizen roles in their local lake, in county lake associations, on watershed management teams, and on statewide policy committees. The 145 graduates of Crew I, II, III, IV, and V are making a difference. They have taken their new skills and personal connections back to their communities and are assisting in the job of preserving and protecting the waters. Graduates are getting involved at many levels. They have been elected to town boards, the Wisconsin Association of Lakes board, county lakes association boards and teams developing state water policy.

This is a wonderful opportunity to learn more and to help our lake in many different ways. I am enjoying the training and look forward to using these new skills, knowledge, and opportunities to assist the Chippewa Flowage and other Wisconsin lakes in the immediate future and the long term.

**CWRLT** CWRLT is a non-profit organization dedicated to preserving unique properties in our area. They offer help in obtaining conservation easements, land donations, bequests and the like that may result in income, estate or property tax benefits. We are delighted to tell you that **CFAPOA Chair Doug Kurtzweil** and **CFAPOA Member Sis Hale** are members of this Board for 2006-07. We know they represent us well and appreciate their many hours of service on our behalf!



At a recent CWRLT meeting the Board agreed to prioritize projects from the WDNR Legacy Report. You may have seen articles in the news about this report that indicate 10 areas of "significant importance" to "preserve and protect" in Sawyer County. The Chippewa Flowage is the only lake on this list! We will see increased efforts of preservation and conservation easements on our waters. **IT WAS FUN!** by Marl Reeder

A number of your CFAPOA Board members and homeowners temporarily worked for the Flowage this summer on a volunteer non-gratis basis. Yes, we attended a learning session at the LCO College so we knew what to look for!! Our job was to scour the shorelines of the Chippewa Flowage and rid it of purple loosestrife (an invasive plant penetrating northern Wisconsin). Carmen & George Sipes in their pontoon and Jack & I in our boat, selected a beautifully sunny day in August to perform our hunt and destroy mission in an assigned area. Our report was most encouraging as purple loosestrife was non-existent in our section of the Flowage.

If you're interested in becoming a weed killer and disposer of nasty seeds, let your board know as we'd love your assistance next year as we comb the flowage for undesirables with binoculars in hand and boots on our feet.

**PURPLE LOOSESTRIFE PATROL**

In addition to the Reeders and Sipes mentioned above, 12 other CFAPOA members participated in the purple loosestrife project coordinated by the Eric Olson, LCO Water Quality Educator, this summer on the west side of the Flowage. Each took a section or two and inspected the shoreline by canoe, kayak or motorboat. Others who participated were Chuck Block, Dennis Clagett, Alan & Linda Fish, Al & Delores Hixson, Jerry & Nancy Johnson, Chris & Patti Jeffords, Nancy Ruhlow, and Barb Schweig. **SAWYER COUNTY LAKES FORUM**

SCLF is a countywide organization that facilitates communication between groups on a variety of relevant lake topics. **WATER LEVELS**

The water level of the Chippewa Flowage is often a topic of conversation and concern by homeowners on our lake. Below are things to keep in mind:

1. Our lake is a FLOWAGE. It was designed to be a "holding tank" until needed elsewhere.
2. Our water level rises and falls based on rain fall and drainage from waterways above us AND the need for water and/or power below us.
3. Our lake's water level is measured in feet above sea level. 1313 ft. is considered full head water. During the summer months, they attempt to keep it between 1313 and 1310. On October 1st, we were at 1309.6 ft. The December 1st goal is 1312 ft.
4. We have had 2 years of extremely dry weather effecting the lake water levels AND the ground water levels as well.

## CFAPOA ANNUAL MEETING MINUTES

### August 13, 2006

Chair Doug Kurtzweil called the meeting to order at 11:12 a.m. with approximately 150 members present. After the introduction of all Board of Director members, Doug introduced our guest speaker, Carroll Schaal, from the WDNR.

Guest Speaker: Mr. Schaal explained there are over 700 lake associations across the state and that they work together under the umbrella group Wisconsin Association of Lakes (WAL) for the improvement of Wisconsin lakes. (*Part of your dues goes to membership in this organization.*) In addition to this statewide organization, each area also has smaller groups to better handle local concerns. For us, that means Northwest Lakes Association and Sawyer County Lakes Forum. Mr. Schaal then discussed how each property owner plays an important part in the health of our lakes. Since the shoreland is the "battle zone" between humans and the water, it's critical that everything possible be done to maintain the buffer between them. That means, for example, not cutting your grass lower than 3 inches as well as not cutting it all the way to the lake, aerating lawns annually, using only non-phosphorus fertilizers and helping reduce water run off into the lake. He then encouraged members to stop by any WDNR office for additional information.

Minutes & Financial Report: Dick Donner moved and June Abendroth seconded the approval of our last CFAPOA Annual Meeting Minutes held on August 7, 2005. Motion passed. The Financial Report was distributed and discussed. Doug explained that the Board is preserving the monies raised from the 75<sup>th</sup> Chippewa Flowage Celebration until a clear consensus of the Board can be reached. Ron Seidel moved and Marl Reeder seconded the approval of the 2005-06 Financial Report as presented. Motion passed.

Committee Reports: Doug quickly provided an update of each committee's work.

- Fish Habitat – No fish cribs were built this year due to a lack of a fish management plan from the DNR. We remain hopeful that this activity will be reinstated next year.
- Grants & Funding - The raffle sales are going very well so far and the Board appreciates the membership's response to this effort.
- Invasive Species – Beetle foreman Dennis Clagett has grown and released 12,000 beetles that are eating the unwanted purple loosestrife. Members of the association have joined with the LCO in surveying the west side of the Flowage and removing the tops of these plants thus retarding their spread.
- New Members – Packets are being sent to all new members which contain Neighborhood Watch and other valuable information.
- Shoreline Protection – Board members continue to observe local and state meetings that develop and oversee shoreline policies.
- Social – We had another year of successful social events including the Holiday Party and Spring Fling.
- Water Quality – This committee is taking 8 samples at 24 sights over the summer to establish a baseline of information about the water in our lake.

Mary Kahler Memorial: A picnic table and plaque will be dedicated to Mary's memory on September 8, 2006, between 1-2 p.m. on Pine Island located just west of the Banana Islands on the west side of the Flowage. Mary was the longtime secretary and one of the prime promoters of our organization. Mary passed away last August.

Retirement: Carmen Sipes was thanked for her 3 years of service on the Board of Directors. Carmen served as co-chair of both the Social and Fish Habitat Committees. Her talents and contributions will be missed by the Board.

Elections: Dick Donner moved and Larry Kirby seconded the unanimous election of Diane Collins, Donna Gilbertson, Terry Kinderman, and Marl Reeder to 3 year terms as Directors of the CFAPOA. Motion passed. Dick Donner moved and Gerald Brodsky seconded the unanimous election of Barb Schweig as CFAPOA Secretary for 2006-07. Motion passed.

Chippewa Islands Project (CHIP) Update: Doug thanked everyone for their continued support of this \$1.5 million project. The purchasing of Big Timber and Moonshine Islands is a preservation effort that will be enjoyed by our children and our children's children. Although we are still \$40,000 short of the final funds needed to purchase Moonshine Island, we expect completion of this by the end of 2006.

Bylaw Changes: Terry Herder moved and John Kaiser seconded the approval of the Bylaw changes as printed. Motion passed. These changes provide that membership be determined by property ownership, being granted one vote per property, and that only one signature be needed on CFAPOA checks.

Thank yous: Doug thanked Dennis and Ruth Aaron for providing this wonderful facility and accommodations for our meeting, Dennis Clagett for the audio system, Jack Schlipper and George Greismer for their cooking efforts and talents, all the members who helped with set-up/take down and who provided desserts.

Adjournment: Ellie Seidel moved and Jerry Brodsky seconded the meeting be adjourned at 12:00 p.m. Motion passed.


