FROM DOUG KURTZWEIL, CHAIR

Warm winter greetings from the shore of our Chippewa Flowage! While it is obviously winter, it has been fairly warm. Temperatures have been moderate with just 1 cold morning—New Years Day at 15 below. Only 2 snowfalls of several inches each; it seems like they just don't make winters like they used to. It is beautiful out there and really easy for everyone and everything to get around. It would be nice though, to get some snow before any extended stretch of sub-zero weather.

You and your CFAPOA have continued to work hard on a variety of initiatives. I heartily congratulate all of you on your efforts and your successes. I want to take a bit of your time to focus on just 2 items—one has taken a long time to get this far; the other could, potentially, be the most serious threat to the Flowage of our lifetimes.

As many of you know we have been working for years to get some regulatory relief to help us in restoring the historical balance to the fish population in the Flowage. (See archived newsletters at www.cfapoa.org) After several years of effort we were granted at least temporary relief from the onerous 14" minimum size limit on largemouth bass (LMB) 2 years ago. On April 8, 2013 at 7PM at Hayward High School we, YOU and me, have a very real opportunity to change the LMB season to a normal May Opener. After 7+ years, the WDNR has put this question on the Conservation Congress ballot as a proposed rule change. Meetings are held statewide in EVERY county. PLEASE show up, speak up, and VOTE! If you have attended in the past, do it again. If you never have, 2013 is a great time to start. This change would go into effect on May 3, 2014. A couple years of bountiful LMB harvests and our walleye fishery could be on its way back! Oh, by the way, there's also another proposal...to open up all waters of the state, including the Chippewa Flowage, to motor trolling. All species, 3 lines per passenger. Show up, and VOTE!

Northern Wisconsin can be a tough place to make a living, especially for someone with limited formal education. I know well. I have made snow at Telemark, lifted trees at the DNR Nursery, and taped drywall at the Builders of Winter. Anything to try to get a regular paycheck. I fully support the rights of property owners to do what they choose on their properties—as long as the effects do NOT cross the lot lines. And, not just horizontally, but also vertically—up into the air, or down, into the soil and eventually the groundwater. While we need more jobs up here, we cannot afford them at the expense of our woods, waters, wildlife, and quality of life.

A year ago big-city interests from down-state and big-money interests from out-of-state tried to push through a change that would have gutted all sorts of protections out of Wisconsin's mine permitting process. Republican State Senator Dale Schultz stood tall as a 'statesman of the year' by casting the crucial vote in the 17-16 defeat of this attempt. By the time you read this another so-called mining bill will have been introduced. I hope it is not as radical and extremist as last year's. I am not optimistic.

What's my problem? Well, they're planning to use this change in the law to 'fast-track' the development of the largest open-pit iron ore mine in the WORLD just a few miles uphill and upstream from the headwater lakes of the East Fork of the Chippewa River! I am concerned. You should be too. Check this out. Research it. Do your homework. The failure of a tailings pond dike could have a greater impact on your Flowage experience AND your Flowage property values than a failure of the Winter dam. And, take more time and money to remedy—if it could be at all. Everyone on or near the Chippewa River all the way to Pepin and Nelson ought be concerned. Some folks in Iron County and Hurley aren't. They know the flow. It's either into Ashland County via the Bad River or at us via the East Fork. "We can't all live upstream." Reminds me of the 3rd Rule of Plumbing.



COMMITTEE REPORTS

FISHERIES by Terry Moe, Chair
(Committee members: John Kaiser, Rick Marks & Doug Kurtzweil)



Max Wolter, the new DNR fish manager for Sawyer County, gave us permission to include (in this newsletter) his recent update on Chippewa Flowage fish management issues. This was discussed at the CFAPOA December 6 Board meeting and at the December 13 Chippewa Flowage Partners meeting. It is being included because Max is trying to do a good job addressing Chippewa Flowage fisheries and informing interested parties about what he is doing. Overall, the information is good news because progress is being made on issues the Board believes CFAPOA members care about. READ MAX'S UPDATE on pages 6 & 7.

His second topic indicates that DNR is proposing to change the large mouth bass harvest date to the same day as the spring fishing season opening (first weekend in May). The target year for the change is 2014, but this is being brought to membership attention now because it will be a statewide question at the 2013 spring hearings. So pay attention and try to attend the spring conservation hearings (held on the second Monday of April) so you can support this change.

Max's seventh (last) update topic may be controversial on the Flowage. It deals with allowing motor trolling on Sawyer County lakes similar to what is allowed on lakes in surrounding counties. This also will be a spring hearing item. The Board may or may not be able to develop a position on this proposed change unless we know there is some consensus of opinion among CFAPOA members. Please let your Board of Directors know.

INVASIVE SPECIES by Dennis Clagett



Attention all Adopt-A-Shoreline participants: If you've been frustrated with your purple loosestrife area because you can see the flowers but can't get to them in the summer, this might be the answer to that situation. Put on your snowshoes or cross country skis and instead of removing the flowers in the summer, go to the area now and remove the canes (flower remains). Just

make sure you're going only to safe areas and be sure you haul away whatever plant material you've carefully removed. If some seeds are dropped in the process not to worry. Removing the cane and its seeds is the important part. The canes and stems are very tough and sharp and tend to puncture the bag so be careful and don't do a "Johnny Apple seed".

If your section doesn't have this problem and you'd like to try this, I know many locations that do need attention. Just call me 715-462-4814.

Good luck and let me know if you have any questions and if this method works for you.

CFAPOA'S PARTNER ORGANIZATIONS

New to CFAPOA? Being connected with other organizations that value the Chippewa Flowage is important for us. Below is a description of the various organizations CFAPOA works with during the year to help and protect the Chippewa Flowage. CFP — Chippewa Flowage Partners

The Chippewa Flowage Partners (CFP) group, formerly known as the Chippewa Reservoir Steering Committee, was formed following an October, 2006, public meeting with Xcel Energy to discuss low summer water levels on the Flowage. In the August, 2000, Chippewa Flowage Joint Agency Management Plan, the parties (Lac Courte Oreilles Band of Lake Superior Chippewa Indians, Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, and United States Department of Agriculture-Forest Service) agreed to establish a joint, non-regulatory team to facilitate on-going communication and the resolution of outstanding issues. The CFP is now that team. In addition to the "parties", XCEL Energy, CFAPOA, LCFRA, and Wisconsin Conservation Congress are also members of the Chippewa Flowage Partners.

Example topics addressed have included water level management, vegetation and fisheries management, erosion control, dissolved oxygen monitoring, invasive species, cultural resource protection, and public access.

It is the responsibility of the CFAPOA liaison(s) to represent Association members' interests with at CFP meetings. Try to become informed about Flowage management issues by reading the Association Newsletter and by other means. Be sure to contact a CFAPOA Board member if you need information or wish to make your opinion known.

CWRLT — Couderay Waters Regional Land Trust

CWRLT's mission is "protecting and promoting preservation of the natural environment of Northwestern Wisconsin through land conservancy." SUBJECT: Preview of Chippewa Flowage Fishery Management Activity for December 13 Partner Group Meeting in Hayward

We are planning to report significant progress in our understanding and management of the Chippewa Flowage fishery at our upcoming Partner Group Meeting at the WDNR Service Center in Hayward on December 13. We are providing this brief summary of ongoing projects and pending actions so you have an opportunity to formulate questions, concerns, and suggestions prior to our meeting. We look forward to visiting with everyone on the 13th.

- **Extension of the length limit exemption for largemouth bass:** As everyone knows, largemouth bass abundance in the Chippewa Flowage is considerably higher than target levels identified in the 2007 Fishery Management Plan. As partners, we have been working together to allow (by regulation) and promote (by educational events) selective harvest of overabundant small bass. In 2010 largemouth bass were exempted from the statewide minimum length limit (14 inches) under the statutory authority of NR 20.35 based on their slow growth rate (too many mouths to feed). Our 2011 creel survey documented that many anglers took advantage of the opportunity to harvest largemouth bass that previously had been protected by length limit. That 2011 survey also documented excellent compliance with the 14-inch minimum length limit that remained in effect for smallmouth bass based on strong stakeholder buy-in for developing a type of bass fishery that is compatible with walleye. We appreciate the hard work of our partners in promoting selective harvest of bass on the Flowage, including sponsoring the annual Big Chip Fish Fest and printing bass ID brochures. In order to maintain positive momentum, we have drafted a proposal to extend the largemouth bass length limit exemption through 2016. Fisheries Management Bureau Director Mike Staggs is prepared to support that proposal until the next rule-making cycle (when a more permanent and appropriate rule can be proposed) if analyses performed on largemouth bass collected in fall of 2012 and spring of 2013 reveal that growth rates are still slow enough to continue invoking NR 20.35. We will be analyzing the fall 2012 samples later this month, collecting more samples in spring of 2013 if necessary, and adding all that information to our proposal for continuing exemption sometime in summer of 2013.
- **Possible removal of the early catch-and-release-only season for largemouth bass:** The statewide WDNR Fisheries Management Board has decided to pose a question at the Wisconsin Conservation Congress 2013 Spring Hearings proposing removal of the early catch-and-release-only season in the Northern Bass Zone for largemouth bass, while maintaining it for smallmouth bass. If this proposal receives support at all stages in the rule-making process, the harvest opener for largemouth bass on the Chippewa Flowage will become the same as for northern pike and walleye – the first weekend in May – starting in 2014. Our partnership has advocated for this change since 2009.

- **Extended-growth walleye fingerling stocking:** The Big Chip Fish Fest and other private fund-raising efforts allowed our private partners to purchase and stock 25,000 extended-growth walleye fingerlings in the Chippewa Flowage in fall of 2012 after the Hayward DNR Fish Management Team documented extremely low natural reproduction of walleyes during mid-September electrofishing surveys. We were very pleased to issue permits for these stocking events and offer advice on stocking strategy and location. Because of complications related to transportation of these fish, high mortality was observed during the second day of the initial stocking effort. An additional 6,000 extended-growth walleyes were provided by the dealer at no extra cost and were stocked the next week. The LCO Tribe also stocked 82,000 small fingerlings in June and 7,043 extended growth fingerlings in September and October. Evaluation of the success of partner stockings of EG walleyes in fall of 2011 and 2012 is ongoing.
- **Walleye length limit:** We are in the process of evaluating the need for a change in walleye fishing regulations. The Chippewa Flowage currently has no minimum length limit for walleye based on previously observed high recruitment and slow growth rates. Implementing a minimum length limit may be appropriate going forward given recent declines in recruitment and overall walleye density. The statewide minimum length limit of 15 inches is one option; it would protect expensive, stocked extended-growth walleye fingerlings for 2-3 years before they would be vulnerable to angler harvest. Protecting young walleyes would increase the odds of restoring walleye as the dominant fish predator in the Chippewa Flowage, which would be desirable for walleye fishing and panfish control purposes. If the walleye population resumes dominance, walleyes will likely recruit naturally, obviating the need to stock expensive extended-growth fish. This would allow future private partner funds to be directed toward island shoreline habitat restoration – a project in which all partners have a significant stake and interest.
- **Analysis of panfish growth:** During the winter of 2012-2013 we will be analyzing bony structures from black crappie and bluegill sampled in the Chippewa Flowage during spring of 2012. This information will be used to characterize growth rates of these species, which will be an important consideration for future management decisions.
- **Muskellunge brood stock egg take:** 2013 is scheduled to be a year in which the Chippewa Flowage is used as a brood source for muskellunge eggs for the Governor Thompson Hatchery in Spooner. Hatchery crews will be out this coming spring collecting the eggs and 2,500 fingerling muskellunge will be stocked back into the Flowage in the fall of 2013.
- **Trolling question at Spring Hearings:** A question will appear on the 2013 Conservation Congress Spring Hearing regarding the legalization of trolling statewide. The question will be phrased to include trolling on all lakes with 3 lines per angler. This would impact the Chippewa Flowage as it is one of several lakes in Sawyer County where trolling is currently prohibited.

Chippewa Storage Reservoir Forecast

Elevation as of December 5, 2012: 1310.75 ft.

Season: Winter 2012-13

Typical Winter Low Elevation: 1308.0 ft.

2012-13 Projected Winter Low Elevation: 1309.0 ft.

Comments

- ▶ Low river flows into the reservoir through the Fall period resulted in limited refill of the reservoir during the fall season. Precipitation measured at the dam was only 2.95" from September 1 – November 30, which is well below normal.
- ▶ Based on the current reservoir level and the low in-flow levels going into the winter season, Xcel Energy forecasts to draw down the reservoir to an elevation of 1309.0 ft. this winter. The drawdown last winter was 3.16 ft. (elevation 1309.84 ft.).
- ▶ The projected 1309.0 ft. drawdown elevation is based on an average winter snowpack and continued low river inflows into the reservoir during the winter months.
- ▶ Discharge flows from the dam will be maintained slightly above minimum levels (>250 cubic feet per second) at the onset of winter and will increase through the winter months to reduce the reservoir to the projected 1309.0 ft. elevation.
- ▶ Xcel Energy will monitor the reservoir level, snowpack, and inflows throughout the winter season to determine if it is necessary to modify the target winter low elevation.
- ▶ If significant snowpack begins accumulating during the winter season, additional water will be drawn from the reservoir, which will likely reduce the reservoir level below the projected 1309.0 ft. elevation.


Definitions of Seasons of the Year for Operating the Chippewa Storage Reservoir:


